Warrior Foundation Freedom Station completed fifteen years of remaining relevant in the honored cause of providing for our warriors and making a significant difference in their medical, social, athletic and family care. # PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

2019 was an outstanding year for our warriors and for me personally.

After retiring from a 30-year Marine Corps career in April, I joined the foundation full-time in May. It has been an absolute privilege to continue serving our country, albeit in quite a different capacity. Like all leadership roles, this is a very personal endeavor and one that I hope to continue for many years to come.

In our quest to enable our nation's post-9/11 ill and injured warriors to live self-sufficient lives through programs that promote recovery, independence, and a passion for the future, we have developed several new programs and enhanced others.

Our post-traumatic stress/traumatic brain injury treatment program took off, resulting in a several hundred percent increase in the number of warriors helped. Those invisible injuries, which were the signature wounds of our wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, do not heal quickly and often go undiagnosed for several years. Finding and funding innovative and effective treatments for our warriors is now a regular arrow in our quiver.

We developed an outdoor therapy program this year that brings warriors outside to enjoy nature and the camaraderie of their brothers and sisters in arms. Our outings have included fishing, hunting, golf, hiking, and shooting, and we plan to add surfing next year. Isolation can be a formable enemy to our warriors. The great outdoors feeds the mind, body, and soul in ways that simply cannot be replicated.

Our adaptive sports program has continued at an impressive level with our San Diego Wolfpack wheelchair basketball team poised to make a national championship run next spring, and our cycling team growing by leaps and bounds.

Our transitional housing efforts intensified as we made tremendous progress on the construction and major remodel of Freedom Station II, our newest home of the brave. We hope to complete this amazing project in early 2020 and significantly impact the lives of our future warrior residents. In addition, we now have a caregiver support program which is already thriving within just a few short months of existence.

I have been absolutely inspired by the selfless dedication of our several hundred volunteers – some of whom put in a full workweek for no money but certainly reap priceless rewards in the joy they feel in giving so much to those who are so deserving.

We continue to receive tremendous support from some large donors, but mostly from hundreds of individuals who give a small consistent donation every month for years on end. We closed the year with an unprecedented level of support from our annual radiothon, hosted by our family at KFMB AM 760 and CBS 8.

We were fortunate as a nation to not have a large number of injured coming from combat zones in 2019. This has given us time to consolidate on the objective, mature our programs, and expand to serve others who might otherwise fall through the cracks.

We look forward to 2020 with confidence that we have the supporters, volunteers, and other resources to answer the call of our nation in serving our post-9/11 ill and injured warriors for a long time to come.

Warrior Foundation Freedom Station assists four main groups of warriors:

- The seriously injured returning home from war with immediate medical and emotional needs;
- Those suffering from post-traumatic stress (PTS) or traumatic brain injury (TBI);
- Physical and occupational therapy patients who are recovering and/or receiving care at military medical facilities;
- Transitioning warriors who are medically retiring and transitioning to civilian life.


# OUR PROGRAMS: QUALITY-OF-LIFE ITEMS

Warrior Foundation Freedom Station serves the needs of injured warriors via our three primary program areas: quality-of-life items, support services and transitional housing.

## Quality-of-Life Items

We provide a wide variety of items that provide comfort to injured service members during recovery and assist with the transition:

- Ultra light wheelchairs.
- Modified combat boots with built-in zippers to accommodate prosthetic limbs and IDEO braces.
- Special hiking boots for warriors with lower limb injuries and IDEO braces.
- iPads with specialized applications for post-traumatic stress (PTS) and traumatic brain injury (TBI).
- High quality pillows, pillow cases, blankets and bath towels.
- Pallets of bottled water and non-perishable food items.
- Christmas gifts provided annually to recovering warriors, including toiletries and personal care supplies, athletic equipment, apparel, military blankets, and more.
- Men's and ladies' business suits for transitioning warriors to go on job interviews and begin new careers.



# OUR PROGRAMS: SUPPORT SERVICES

Warrior Foundation Freedom Station provides support services that positively impact the lives of warriors and their families.

- Adaptive sports programs include the Wolfpack, a wheelchair basketball team, and the WFFS cycling team, comprised of active duty and retired service members.
- Outdoor therapy and recreational activities such as fishing, golf, surfing, climbing, hiking and sporting events offer camaraderie, physical activity and a therapeutic outlet outside hospital walls.
- Education and career guidance includes assistance with college and scholarship applications, internships, résumé writing and job opportunities.
- Vocational projects include automotive builds, videography and other trades that build skills and confidence.
- Innovative treatments for post-traumatic stress (PTS) and traumatic brain injury (TBI).
- Home for the Holidays – hundreds of plane tickets are purchased annually to fly injured warriors home to spend Christmas with their families.
- Travel Funding – assistance with airfare, hotel rooms and rental cars for the visiting families of recovering warriors.



# TRANSITIONAL HOUSING: FREEDOM STATION

## **The Missing Link: Freedom Station**

When Freedom Station opened its doors in 2011, it became the first transitional housing residence of its kind in the San Diego region - a place for healing, personal growth and preparation for the transition to civilian life.

Each of the charming cottages and apartments is fully furnished, move-in ready and stocked with basic household necessities. The idea was to shift warriors from a “barracks mentality” to independent living. The central courtyard and interconnected spaces offer warriors the sense of camaraderie that is so crucial during the transition period. They recover among their peers, share war stories, and know they are supported by others experiencing the same transition.

## **How does Freedom Station differ from other military housing and transitional facilities?**

We are proud of our approach in providing a hand up, not a handout. Many military housing facilities are free and do not charge their residents any rent – an unrealistic preparation for real-world living. Freedom Station residents pay reduced rent so they can learn how to save, budget and become financially responsible.

Most military housing facilities also work with service members after they have already been discharged from the military. Freedom Station moves warriors in *before* they leave the service, giving them the necessary time to acclimate.











# HOME OF THE BRAVE: FREEDOM STATION II

## **The Need Remains: Bringing Freedom Station II to Life**

As evidenced by dozens of Freedom Station success stories, the existence of a supportive transitional environment for ill and injured warriors makes the difference as they begin a new journey outside the service.

Today, San Diego remains home to one of the largest military populations in the world. To meet the need, Warrior Foundation Freedom Station has purchased a second transitional housing residence. The new nine-unit complex has been named Freedom Station II, a nod to its sister property and the continuing mission to help San Diego's warriors successfully transition from military service to civilian life. Freedom Station II features eight one-bedroom cottages and an additional two-bedroom unit. Like its predecessor, the location was chosen to facilitate access to Naval Medical Center San Diego, one of the nation's largest military hospitals and leading centers for amputee care.

Freedom Station II is currently undergoing renovations to ensure that this 'home of the brave' will be the most beautiful, safe and welcoming place worthy of the injured warriors who will call it home. Freedom Station II's anticipated grand opening will be in the spring or summer of 2020.




# FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Revenue Directly Available for Programs (93%)


## 2019 Statement of Expenses

## Program Spending



# SUCCESS STORIES

Dear WFBS Family,

*I just wanted to send you an update on our transition into retirement. It's been one heck of a year and roller coaster ride to say the least. From Nick's claim being butchered and having to enlist the help of our state Senator, ongoing VA appointments, confirmed diagnosis of MS, packing and putting our home on the market, and moving to my home state of beautiful Arizona, it's been crazy. While all this was transpiring, it took an emotional and financial strain on our family.*



*With Nick being a Marine Corps Gunnery Sergeant, it's always been about helping his Marines, not asking for and receiving help for himself or our family. Our thoughts have always been that help should go to young Marine families because we've been there and know the feeling. So, we sucked it up and carried on as best as we could. It became very hard and money was tight with hotel stays and gas for his VA appointments. To add to our stresses, Christmas was fast approaching, bills were piling up, and we were just clinging to faith and prayer.*

*Early in December 2019, while in San Diego for VA appointments, we were able to meet and catch up with Col. Greg Martin (ret.). It was nice to see him in a different compacity, but still doing what he did best and that was making sure our injured service members are taken care of. We've known the Colonel for years going back to when Nick was a patient at Naval Medical Center San Diego (NMCS D) and the Colonel was the Commanding Officer for the Wounded Warrior Battalion.*

*After a nice refreshing visit with the Colonel, later that evening we received a knock on our hotel door. There stood the Colonel with an envelope in hand. With a hug and holiday wishes, he gave me the envelope with strict instructions not to open it until he left. Well, of course I followed orders never expecting such a generous gift from Warrior Foundation Freedom Station. That envelope contained a \$5,000 check that dropped me to my knees in tears. I was so grateful and honestly a bit scared Nick was going to take it back until he saw the relief in my face. With that money I paid our house, credit card and vehicle payments and was able to give my kids a Christmas I had been so worried wasn't going to be much.*

*Now that things are starting to fall into place, I thought it would be nice to give you an update. Warrior Foundation Freedom Station played a big role keeping us afloat in our scary path of transitioning / medically retiring out of the Marine Corps. We are forever grateful and hold you all near and dear to our hearts.*

*“Playing for the Wolfpack wheelchair basketball team gave me back the sense of brotherhood that I needed. We traveled all over America competing in different tournaments. It was a huge part of my recovery and transition to be around like-minded warriors and have that military mentality where we could challenge each other and help each other when it mattered the most.*”



*When I got out of the hospital and medically retired from the Marine Corps, I didn't know what to do next. I was scared to go to school. Sandy Lehmkuhler pushed me to sign up for college and emphasized how important education would be in the next chapter in civilian life. She set up an appointment for me with Southwestern College. I signed up, and Warrior Foundation Freedom Station even assisted with tuition and a laptop for school. I stuck with it until I was able to transfer to the University of Missouri.*

*Now I'm juggling classes with basketball so I wake up around 3 a.m. and get to school by 4:30 a.m. We have practice from 5:30 – 7:30 a.m., and I usually stay afterwards to work out and run through more techniques. Then I go to class, so sometimes I don't get home until 5 or 6 p.m. I feel like I have to push myself for everyone who supports me and roots for me, like Warrior Foundation Freedom Station. If I push my hardest, I will set a good example.*

*I can't thank Sandy and the foundation enough for doing that for me, and for caring enough to put me on the path that has allowed me be where I'm at now. Whenever I feel tired or discouraged, I think about that and it forces me to not waste their time, my time and my family's time.”*

*“I joined the Marine Corps because I wanted to serve my country and I wanted to make a difference. I loved my job being a point man and being in the infantry. It really did feel like a brotherhood. They will do anything to keep you alive, and you will do anything to keep them alive.*”



*I was medically retired in December 2013. Transitioning out of the Marine Corps, that security, stability and structure is not there anymore, so it made transitioning out really difficult. Living in an apartment by myself, I didn't really know what to do. Freedom Station brings you back to a military setting. They give you structure, they give you camaraderie – anything that you would possibly need to transition or carry on with your life.*

*The Wolfpack wheelchair basketball team is also supported by Warrior Foundation Freedom Station. They have helped with our travel expenses, purchased us wheelchairs that are custom-fit for us, and hosted our tournament for the last three years. They make it really easy for us to actually enjoy a sport and to play a sport that we're very passionate about. It's like a second family.”*



He took me under his wing and became a guiding force in my life. He showed me that even when times get tough, something much greater will come from it.
